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21	This stipulation is entered into by and between the Insurance Commissioner of the State of		
22	California (the "Commissioner"), in his capacity as the liquidator of SeeChange Health		
23	Insurance Company, ("SeeChange"), the United States (including, without limitation, the		
24	Department of Health and Human Services, Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services		
25	("CMS")) by and through their respective undersigned counsel, based on the following facts.		
26	RECITALS		
27	A. On January 28, 2015, the Court entered the <i>Liquidation Order</i> in the above-		
28	referenced action. In the Liquidation Order, the Court, among other things, directed the

Commissioner, as liquidator (the "Liquidator"), "to liquidate and wind up the business of SeeChange and to act in all ways and exercise all powers necessary for the purpose of carrying out this Order and the liquidation provisions of the Insurance Code"

- B. On or about December 22, 2015, CMS submitted to the Liquidator a proof of claim for \$5,206,759.13 allegedly owed by SeeChange. This proof of claim was comprised of (i) \$3,211,536.27 in fees allegedly owed under the Permanent Risk Adjustment Program (42 U.S.C. § 18063) of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (the "ACA"); (ii) \$1,988,154 in fees allegedly owed under the Transitional Reinsurance Program of the ACA (42 U.S.C. § 18061); and (iii) \$6,068.86 allegedly owed under the Medicare Secondary Payer Act (42 U.S.C. § 1395y(b)(2)(B)). In its proof of claim, CMS indicates that the claims asserted "are entitled to first priority treatment pursuant to 31 U.S.C. § 3713." In their prior correspondence, counsel to the United States further argued that 31 U.S.C. § 3713 (the "Priority Statute") requires that the Liquidator pay first CMS's claims related to the ACA.
- C. On July 19, 2016, after analyzing CMS's proof of claim, the Liquidator sent his claims determination. In the claims determination, the Liquidator (i) segregates the amounts alleged to be owed under the Medicare Secondary Payer Act to be dealt with in a later date; (ii) allows \$1,988,154 in fees owed under the Transitional Reinsurance Program of the ACA and \$3,211,512.61 in fees under the Permanent Risk Adjustment Program of the ACA (collectively, the "ACA-Related Claims"); (iii) classifies the allowed claims as Class 3 claims; and (iv) disallows all other claims of the United States.
- D. On or about August 26, 2016, the United States Department of Justice filed an Application for an Order to Show Cause regarding POC 500206 pursuant to California Insurance Code § 1032 ("The Order to Show Cause Proceeding"). This Application requested that the Court and the Liquidator "postpone further action on the Claims Determination and the United States' Application until DOJ receives information from the Liquidator necessary for DOJ to search for claims against SeeChange." On August, 26, 2016, prior to any hearing on the application, this Court entered on August 26, 2016 its *Order Deferring the United States*

Department of Justice's Application for an Order to Show Cause Regarding POC Number 500206.

- E. On or about October 6, 2016, the Liquidator filed and served *Insurance* Commissioner's Notice of Motion and Motion to Vacate Order Issued Staying Proceedings and to Set Order to Show Cause for Hearing (the "Motion"). Among other things, the Motion requested that the Court set a hearing to determine the priority of the ACA-Related Claims. The Motion is currently scheduled for November 28, 2016 at 11:00 a.m.
- F. On or about October 24, 2016, counsel for the United States informed the Liquidator that CMS and the United States did not file an Application for an Order to Show Cause regarding the determination of the ACA-Related Claims, that they have determined not to challenge the Liquidator's classification of the ACA-Related Claims, and that they will not assert any liability under the Priority Statute if the Liquidator pays administrative costs and policyholder level claims in this liquidation before the ACA-Related Claims.

STIPULATION

Based on the foregoing recitals, the United States and the Liquidator agree as follows:

- 1. The United States filed an Application for an Order to Show Cause pertaining to rejected proof of claim Number 500206 ["this Order to Show Cause Proceeding"]. The proof of claim filed by the Department of Justice Number 500206 seeking to assert "unknown" claims shall be reinstated to the status of neither approved nor rejected. That proof of claim may be the subject of a future claims determination, to which California Insurance Code § 1032 would apply. This stipulation thus obviates this Order to Show Cause Proceeding as moot. The Motion pertaining to this Application is accordingly withdrawn. The proof of claim filed by CMS, POC Number 500201, shall be deemed resolved as set forth in Paragraph 2.
- 2. The proof of claim filed by CMS, POC Number 500201, is resolved by the approval letter issued by the Liquidator and by this stipulation. The United States and CMS are not challenging and will not challenge the Liquidator's determination to classify the ACA-Related Claims, as approved in substantial part, as Class 3 under California Insurance Code section 1033 and they will not assert liability under the Priority Statute if the Liquidator pays

1	Class 1 and Class 2 claims (i.e., administrative costs and policyholder level claims) before the	
2	ACA-Related Claims are paid.	
3	3. This stipulation and the accompanying order are without prejudice to the other	
4	claims of the United States and CMS. The Liquidator, the United States, and CMS expressly	
5	reserve their rights to litigate the validity and priority of those claims, if necessary.

- 1. This Order to Show Cause Proceeding is rendered moot, because Proof of Claim Number 500206 filed by the United States Department of Justice as to "unknown claims" is hereby is restored to the status of "neither approved nor rejected." Any further action on this proof of claim will require a further approval or rejection by the Liquidator, as to which the provisions of California Insurance Code § 1032 would apply. The hearing on the Motion, which is currently set for November 28, 2016 at 11:00 a.m., is hereby vacated.
- 2. The ACA-Related Claims asserted by the Department of Health and Human Services, Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, to the extent approved, are classified as Class 3 under California Insurance Code section 1033, in accordance with the partial approval of Proof of Claim Number 5002016.
